Catshill Library

Space Hop 2010.

Sixty-seven children aged between 4 and 12 years took part in an exciting national reading challenge last summer at the Catshill library in Barley Mow Lane. The reading challenge, set by the Reading Agency, was to read 6 or more books, fiction or non-fiction, during the summer holiday. Those taking part had to help the crew of the spaceship "Ex-Libris" in its mission to set up the first library on the moon. A total of 39 children completed the challenge and many of these were presented with a medal, prizes and a certificate at the special award ceremony held in the library. The awards were presented by parish councillors Gordon Witcomb and Alan Kelly, local CSO Kirsten Bowkett, and Kerry Cullen and Sara Townsend from the new Tulip Tree Children's Centre in Gibb Lane. Prizes were also awarded to the winner and runners-up in the Space Hop colouring competition where the children had to create a picture of themselves as a crew member of the Ex-Libris spaceship. Library staff were delighted with the number and enthusiasm of the children taking part and completing the challenge and look forward to seeing even more participating this year.

Where is Catshill?

When asked from where do I come, I usually reply that I am from a semi rural village situated in Worcestershire that is approximately half way between the cities of Birmingham and Worcester. However, I have always felt that our parish associates far more with Worcester than with the city of Birmingham, which is very different culturally. The village is *geographically* closer to Birmingham than to Worcester according to the milestone situated on the A38 opposite the Mui Mui take away. If you have not looked at it, let me tell you that it clearly states "Worcester 15 miles, Birmingham 11 miles". So there we have it, we are 4 miles closer to Birmingham than to Worcester! Next time you look at this milestone, please note how smart it looks. This is because a member of the Milestone Society cleaned and repainted it last year. The parish council gave a small donation to the society in recognition of its hard work.

If you have ever wondered what milestones are, you may be interested in reading about their history at www.milestonesociety.co.uk. It is a fascinating website with many photographs and explanations of the origins of milestones, some of which date back to Roman times. It also informs how many were removed during the Second World War, in a bid to confuse any invading armies. Thankfully, most were reinstated after the war.

Bus Stops



Many readers, especially those who use public transport may have noticed that last year two new modern clean bus shelters appeared within the parish. One replaced the rather dilapidated shelter located on the Stourbridge Road between the War Memorial and the Crown Inn, and a smaller one was sited near the mini roundabout at the junction of Gibb Lane, Meadow Road and Wildmoor Lane.

Both these new shelters were paid for by Catshill & North Marlbrook Parish Council and the council is confident that they are being appreciated by all who use them.

The original concrete Stourbridge Road shelter was in a very poor condition and whilst in times past it had been a fine structure, by 2010 it was in a sorry state, cracked and badly damaged by wear and tear, suffering from several waves of poor repair work and generally looking ugly, overgrown and uncared for, right at the "entrance" to Catshill village.

The bus stop at the mini roundabout is very well used but had no shelter, meaning bus passengers were exposed to the elements.

The parish council decided that by installing new shelters then bus use would be encouraged and the experience of using local public transport could be enhanced, benefiting us all by helping to reduce the amount of traffic on our roads whilst promoting a healthier and greener future.

Also the parish council realises that as our ageing population increases then the demand for appropriate and comfortable public transport will rise.

The parish council will continue to maintain these new structures and will consider adding further shelters in the future, either by funding them outright or by lobbying other agencies to add, repair and replace as and when necessary. The parish council is hopeful that all residents are proud of these new shelters and will agree that they are enhancing parish life.
